


# **Ek Mulakat** that never happened

egendary Indian thespian Girish Karnad journeyed into the afterlife on June 10 2019. The actor and director was to grace Prabha Khaitan Foundation's event, Ek Mulakat, with Sangeeta Datta as the conversationalist.

Datta's write up in his memory was published in Outlook India, excerpts of which we are reproducing in this month's newsletter.

A foundational pillar of the Indian theatre revival, my introduction to Girish was through his plays – *Yayati* and *Tughlaq* (the latter made him a national icon). A marvellous conversationalist, he loved coming home for what he called Bengali *adda* and stayed on till late hours discussing classical music, literature and repeatedly engaging with a crucial question "What is it to be Indian? How can one be an Indian artist?"

While discussing historical plays Girish Karnad would often say, "History is alive, because it links the past to today's living moment. The historical event has long gone, but the play is right in front of you. That is always fascinating." Today, Girish passed away from the present, but will remain etched to our history for a long time to come.

When he came to live in London as Minister of Culture, Embassy of India, Girish remained true to his effusive disposition and opened up the Nehru Centre as a dynamic space for the arts.

Perhaps it was this sense of linking history to the present that inspired me to write a

present-day adaptation of Shakespeare's King Lear for my feature *Life Goes On*. And who better to play my Lear but Girish himself? As he slipped into the skin of my protagonist Sanjay Banerjee, we started a journey of brilliant interaction and collaboration.

A man of infinite knowledge, Girish wore his wisdom light and thus started the memorable bonding with Om Puri (who was an FTII student when he was Dean).

Girish was a towering renaissance man, a polymath, an erudite scholar, an impulsive actor, a man with a vision. For me, it has been a privilege getting to know him (as with Shyam Benegal, Shabana Azmi, Om Puri) who helped formulate our sense of arts and culture, indeed aesthetics.

In July, my film *Life Goes On* will light up the giant summer screens in Wembley Park. The curator tells me that the film was made much before its time and the younger audience must watch it again as it addresses issues of identity, migration and gender. Sharmila Tagore will be there. Perhaps Girish and Om will watch from someplace else.



# Rediscovering MANTO



Das recalled how she got to know Manto, "I discovered Manto when I watched a play in my college. In 2012, I wanted to make a film on him and started researching." She went to Lahore to know about the man behind the author. She met Manto's sister-inlaw (sister of Manto's wife), who is around 75 years old. Speaking about the challenge in making a film on real person Das said, Manto died at the young age of 42 and very little material was available on him. There was no video on Manto to know of his voice but we decided to move ahead.

Siddiqui said, "Das's research on the subject made his job easy. I got a role that matches my sensibilities. In real life I am unable to speak and unable to express my thoughts. A film allows you to speak all you wanted in real life through the character." Talking about his experience of doing this film, Siddiqui said that after many years he had known someone who is completely honest in thought. "Manto's thoughts were his own. Manto wrote what he saw and always spoke the truth," he said.





her Senior Cambridge from The Convent of Jesus and Mary, before attaining her Bachelor's degree in Home Science from Lady Irwin College; and a Master's in Psychology from Delhi University with a specialization in Personality. She taught Psychology for a short while at the same university to undergraduate students. Neelima has inculcated her mother's passion for both the spoken and written word and divides her time between writing and pursuing her interest in poetry, philosophy and the paranormal.



iterature has carved its niche till today in Indian cinema. Our predecessors expressed their creative ingenuity through the songs, poems and dialogues while laying a solid foundation for us. The new generation has no right to raise a poor building on this foundation handed down to us, said Bollywood lyricist and writer Manoj Muntashir.

Speaking about his journey in writing and the role of literature in cinema with moderator Neelima Dalmia Adhar at a session in Kalam, Muntashir admitted, "I have not written a song that does not have streaks of literature."

Reminiscing about his days of struggle, he said, "I was fond of listening to film songs since a young age. When I was in Class X, I started writing poems, songs and ghazals, which got me recognition. It was then that I decided to come to Mumbai from Allahabad University."

The poet and lyricist said he considered the likes of Sahir Ludhianvi, Gulzar and Javed Akhtar among other lyricists as his idol. These lyricists brought great literature to film songs.

He said, "I am trying to keep the tradition alive by penning poems that touch people's hearts in the films."

The select audience that had gathered from across the National Capital Region (NCR) were hooked to the conversation between Muntashir and Neelima.

## 'It is not easy to put a story into words'

e employ all kinds of means when we wish to know the truth. But I have seen these means that we use to get to the truth can also confuse us. In small cities, Rangbaaz

is not born a Chocolate Hero," bestselling author, Dr Pravin Kumar, said this in a candid conversation with Anish Ankur at **Kalam session** in Patna. He spoke about his story writing and Hindi literature while discussing his book "Chabila Rangbaaz ka Shahar".

Dr Kumar told the audience that the book has four chapters – Chabila Rangbaaz ka Shahar, Laden Ojha ki Hasraten, Naya Zafarnaama and Chillax! Leeladhari. It took more than six months to write each story. Chabila Rangbaaz ka Shahar took the maximum time. The book speaks about the struggles of people in small cities, how people who try to throw light on truth are brutally killed, unemployment among youth, and stories of people facing financial problems and casteism, Dr Kumar said, adding, "An author keeps reading the human mind."

Ankur asked Kumar as to how he developed an interest in writing to which he replied that in his college days, whenever he had an interesting thought about something, he would pen it down. He said, "It is not easy to write a story, as people think. While writing a story, the author gets inside a character and finishes writing about its journey." He said an author may have put in his best, but readers are the one who make him or her a 'hero or zero'.

The author has graduated from the Hindu College, Delhi University. His collection of stories *Chabila Rangbaaz ka Shahar* got Dr Vijay Mohan Singh Smriti Yuva Katha Samman in 2018. The book also received the first 'Amar Ujala Shabd Samman in 2018. His book was declared bestseller, twice, by Dainik Jagran.




